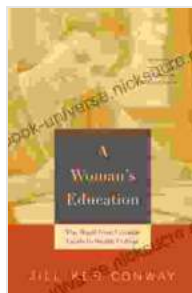


A Trailblazing Advocate for Women's Education: The Legacy of Jill Ker Conway

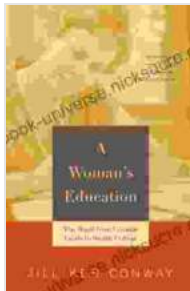
