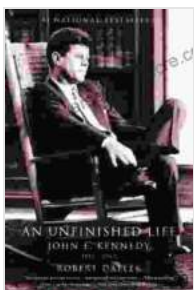


An Unfinished Life: John F. Kennedy, 1917-1963

Early Life and Education

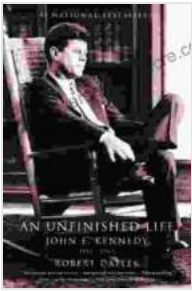

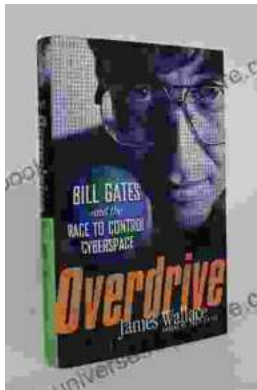

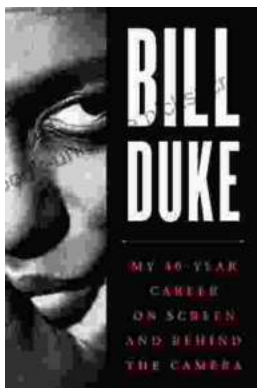
