


# **Captain Henry Mowat: A Military Legend and Hero of the American Revolutionary War**



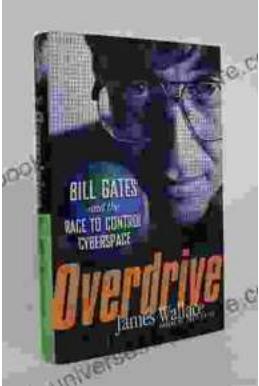

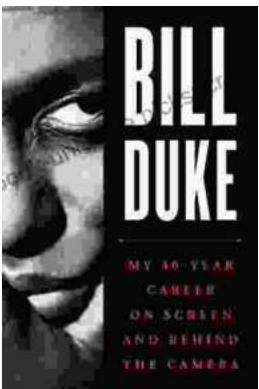
