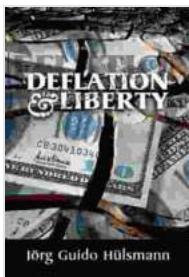


Deflation and Liberty: The Story of Lvmi Mary Lou Quinlan

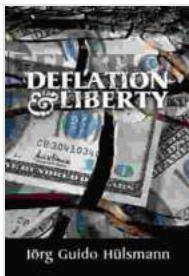
