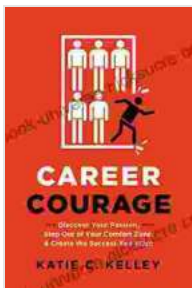

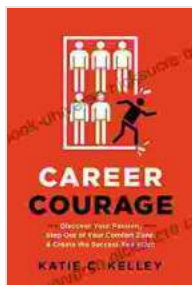
5. Take Action

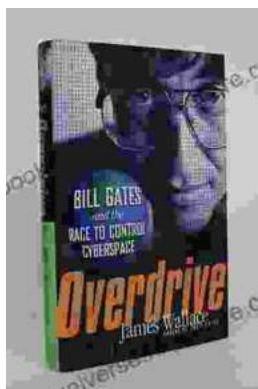

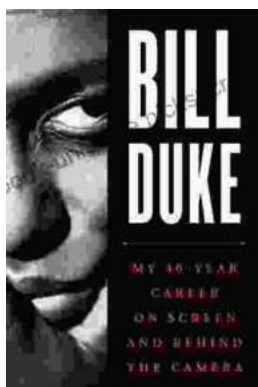
