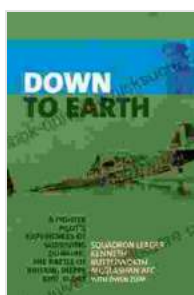

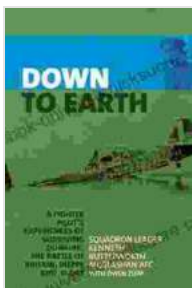
Dieppe

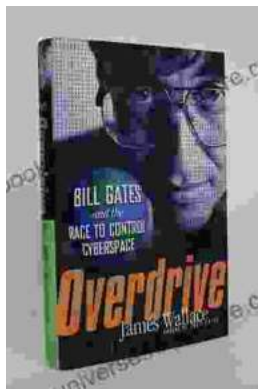

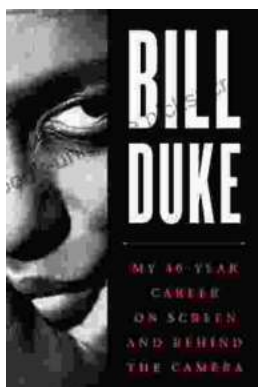
