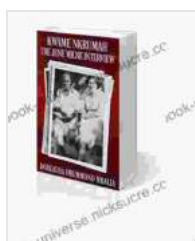


Kwame Nkrumah: The June Milne Interview and Unseen Images of Ghana's First President

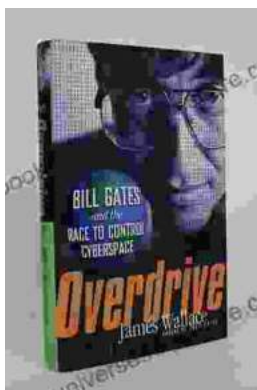

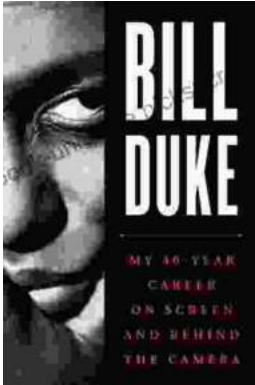
