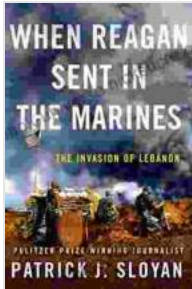


Reagan's Dispatch of the Marines: A Controversial Legacy in Grenada

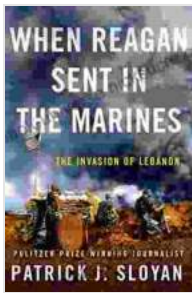

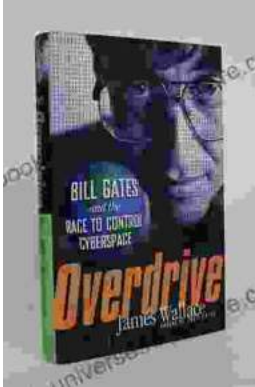

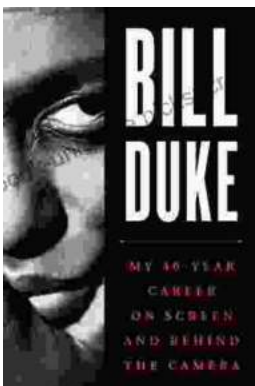
