
Sherman March Burke Davis: The Prolific Artist and Teacher



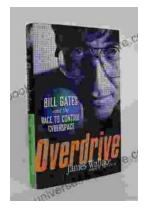

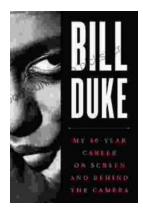
