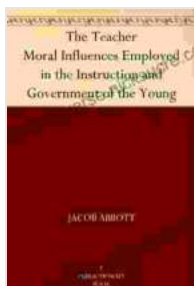


The Teacher's Moral Influences: Employed in the Instruction and Government of the Sunday School

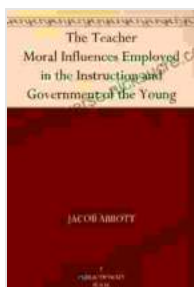
