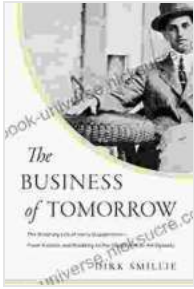
Early Life and Family

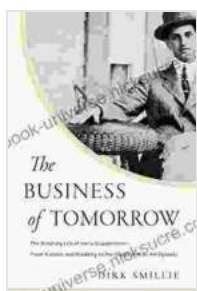

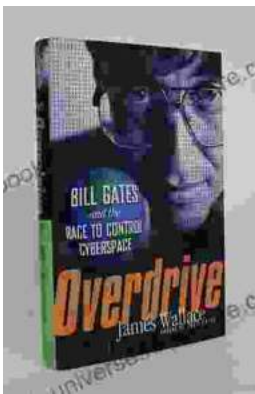

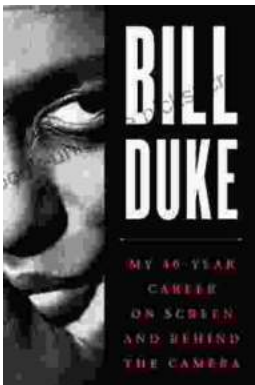
