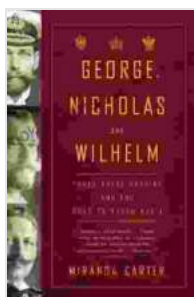


Three Royal Cousins and the Road to World War

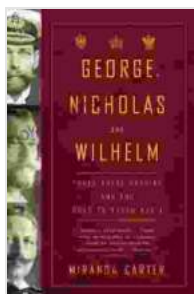

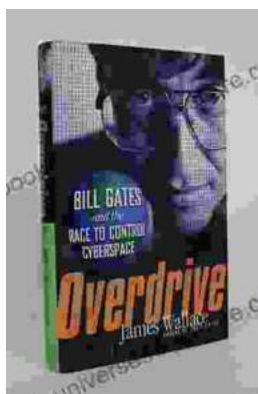

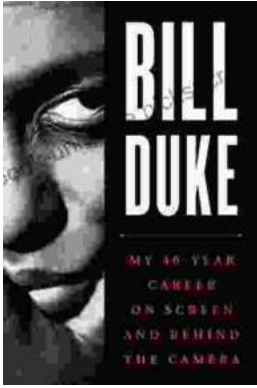
