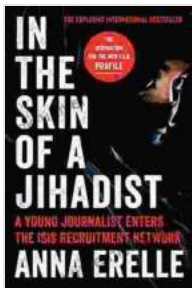


Young Journalist Enters The Isis Recruitment Network

She spent months posing as a potential recruit, communicating with ISIS recruiters and supporters online and in person. Going Undercover

Sherlock's investigation began with a simple online search. She typed "ISIS recruitment" into Google and was presented with a number of websites and social media pages dedicated to promoting the group. She started by following these accounts and interacting with their content. Soon, she was contacted by ISIS recruiters who began to groom her for recruitment.

Countering ISIS Recruitment

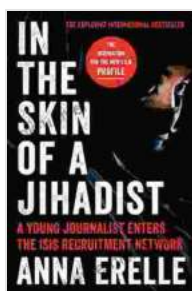
